

PROGRAMS & WORKSHOPS - Donna Petrick

Betsy Chutchian, known for her reproduction guilts and author of *Gone to* Texas: Quilts from a Pioneer Woman's Journal, will be our June speaker.

Betsy inherited some scrappy quilts from her great-grandmother and was inspired to recreate the look with reproduction fabrics. She also found a family diary, and she has translated this happy combination into a terrific book.

Betsy is a co-founder of the "19th-Century Patchwork Divas," a group that exchanges reproduction blocks. Their guilts were featured at several Quilt Festival venues this past year and a few are in Betsy's book. The group chooses an antique to reproduce, generates a pattern, and members make blocks for each other and the group. Their exchange set up is interesting --- and labor intensive---but it really sounds like fun. If, for example, six members decide to participate for a 36 block quilt, each is required to make six blocks for each of the other five members and a set for herself. Everybody winds up with a set of 36 blocks.



More than 150 years ago a pioneer family left a sign on their Kentucky door reading "Gone to Texas." As did so many of their generation, Robert and Lizzie Carpenter packed up their belongings and headed West to find a better life. They chose the North Central Texas prairie to set up housekeeping. And, it was here, on their newly built homestead, that Lizzie began writing her journal, which she kept from 1857 to 1882. Chronicled within its pages are the details of pioneer life—including her deep love for guiltmaking.

In 2007, Lizzie's great-great granddaughter and award winning guiltmaker and historian, Betsy Chutchian, discovered the journal, now housed at Haggard Library in Plano, Texas, and was delighted to discover they shared a common passion for guiltmaking.

Join Betsy as she embarks on a journey to recreate 12 of her great-great grandmother's guilts inspired by her writing. And read as she shares the journal entries that capture the essence of pioneer life, often characterized by harsh realities and the sameness of chores that seemed never ending, softened by the beauty, pleasure and friendship found in guiltmaking.

For the month of June the meeting will be held at SMU-in-Plano. SMU-in-Plano is located at 5236 Tennyson **Parkway** in Plano, between the Dallas North Tollway and Preston Road.

COMMUNITY SERVICE - Julie Schaefer

The last three weeks have certainly been interesting and challenging. A group of us from the Guild (Joan Wilson, Tina Connolly, Rose Clair Fletcher, Marvel Link and a friend from the Dallas Guild, Jean Scott, Germaine Reconnu and her daughter, Julie and I) went to Paducah, Kentucky. We viewed the International Quilt Show, went through The National Quilt Museum but were primarily there to take a 5 day class in "Dye-Painting & Quilting".

Paducah has quite an Arts District and is where Caryl Bryer Fallert bases her quilting. Who knew? The Quilt Show was wonderful but not as convenient as Houston's. Paducah has their quilts and vendors on various levels of a building and 3 buildings. The Quilt Museum, in the lower town arts district, was absolutely fantastic and had one room designated to exhibiting many of the better known quilts made by our teacher, Hollis Chatelain. I don't have the words to express the visual impact her quilts make; suffice to say she has won many awards for her fantastic quilts. Her criteria for winning are: a design that is unique, colors that make an impact (she uses thread color in her quilting to achieve this), perfect quilting that flows with the design (she admitted to having spent many an hour along with her husband taking out stitches) and a quilt that has a current and important message to convey. She uses her table top Bernina for everything.

Now the dye-painting was hard for me to get started on. But it was sort of like finger painting, once you get started its fun and you just want to go on and on. The quilting part was exceedingly intimidating if you realize that "stitch in the ditch" is a challenge for me. To make a long story short there were 22 people in the class all artistically making hands, feet, eyes, faces, children, intricate pictures and designs. Many plaudits went to them. I made an artichoke. Well it was a better choice than a tree, mushroom, tulip, fence etc. that I would draw in church to keep my kids busy and quiet. However, I did have a good time and did learn a lot. In fact I would even take another of Hollis' classes. I will first need a basic texture class in watercolor.

This is the end of the year of service for the QGP's 2009-10 Board. VP Community Service is an involving position. Taking the items we have made to the various agencies is the least demanding part and we are always welcomed with smiles and praises. This year we have been given a tremendous amount of fabric. So much fabric that throughout the year Karen gave away fabric to other Guilds as well as to agencies that help people get back on their feet by offering them a creative outlet of learning how to quilt. Washing, folding the fabric and placing the pieces in order of color was a bit challenging at times. The push at the end of 2009 to have at least 1200 Christmas stockings completed by the end of November was something I don't want to repeat. I am so glad that people are willing to do them all year. Sorry we didn't have any for you at the meeting on the 13th. A big hug and kisses to those that handed in 105 at the meeting. Don't forget that LaDawn Dalley is planning on having a big stocking sew-in on July 27th at the Plano Sewing Center. Put it on your calendar. LaDawn will continue doing the stocking project and it is LaDawn that you need to email that you will be coming on July 27th. Isdalley@verizon.net. Along with the stockings we always fill them with items for children or for the new mothers in the ante partum ward of Parkland hospital. They are so needy of just the basics. Thank you to those that remembered to keep the hotel shampoo, conditioner, soap, and lotions while on a trip. We brought back a bag full from our Paducah trip.

Each year the Guild becomes more and more involved with the community through our education services. Teresa Knode planned and successfully completed an after school program for elementary schools, sewing fabric strips at the Quilt 2009 show in conjunction with the Plano Sewing Center who allowed us to use 6 of their machines, and we were once again involved at the International Festival doing crayon coloring on fabric with children. Debbie Skorepa was at the festival, at the Quilt 2009 show and at a retirement home training anyone who was interested in the art of Red Work. Joan Wilson did a tremendous presentation/Quilt Turning in McKinney at the North Texas History Center. Margaret Schafer will be taking over Teresa's position as Education Chair and I know that she has a lot of good ideas.

The biggest and most productive section of Community Service is the sewing we do making quilts, cough pillows and pillow cases. Karen Christoffer is the energy behind all of this. She has a huge room in her home that is packed with the entire Guild's fabric. From this fabric she makes kits for us to work on every second Tuesday of every month as well as those kits that are offered at the general meeting for anyone to take home and make at their own pace. She decides on the patterns we are going to make, how we can utilize the fabric in the best possible way, cuts the fabric, makes kits, types up instructions, leads us in making quilt tops, obtains batting, cuts backing and puts the whole thing together. Karen is vital to the Guild! Give her a big hug and "Thank you." Next time you see her. We did give 50 quilts to the Collin County Rape Crises Center, 173 quilts to the Collin County Children's Advocacy Center, and we have 7 extra

large quilts to go to the Veterans Administration. We also gave 100 pillowcases to ConKerr Cancer and 80 to the Children's Advocacy Center. We made 100 cough pillows for The Medical Center of Plano Surgical Ward and Maria Eaken and her mom, Enriqueta Benavides, made 45 more which were also given to the Medical Center. Don't forget to put June 22nd on your calendar for a cough pillow sew-in at the Plano Sewing center. Please email Karen so that she will know how to set up the room.

Thank God Karen will continue this next year being the incentive for making more quilts and of course we appreciate any that you made from your stash to add to our donations. Remember that the second Tuesday of every month we will always be at the Plano Sewing Center which is on the SE corner of Custer and Spring Creek between 10:00 and 4:00. Let Karen know that you will be coming so she can be prepared with enough kits. <u>Karen.christoffer@tx.rr.com</u>

This year June Austin wore her fingers to the bone crocheting afghans. She made a total of 42 that were of various sizes and designs. They went to the Rape Crisis Center, Children's Advocacy Center and Veteran's Administration. She also made 39 baby caps that went to Newborn's in Need. Whenever you have some 4 ply yarn and don't know what to do with it, remember to give it to me so I can see that June gets it. She is just so wonderful to do this for those in need.

I spend a lot of time keeping the documentation of service hours. I want to thank Lynn Fritsch for making sure I am on her list of people to receive all new members' names. She has taken over very smoothly for Joan Stevenson. Documentation of service hours is a task appointed in the by laws to the position of VP Community Service. My biggest complaint is that people don't let me know when they have earned service hours. When you piece a quilt, make a stocking, cough pillow or pillowcase, work at one of the education sites, clean out someone's sewing room to give the fabric and quilting tools to the guild, quilt and/or bind a quilt, take items to an agency, come to a community sew, you are serving the community through the Guild. Please either write the hours in Karen's 3-ring binder or email me with the hours and what they are for – briefly - and don't forget the time spent traveling to and from wherever you are. juliescha@sbcglobal.net I know there are people that have spent many hours just organizing for the guild meeting and you are forgetting to let me know. What about you Emily Armstrong, Teresa Knode, Donna Lobelson, Carrie Oransky, Sandra Vinzant, Brooks Wilson? Remember that we need all documentation for the grant writing and to justify our status as a 501.3c agency (did I get that number right Shirley Weaver?)

Obviously another task of my position is to write a column for the Guild newsletter and to keep documentation of and about all that has been done in and for the community. It has been a natural outlet for me and I will enjoy doing it for another year with you're blessings.

Rose-Clair Fletcher – is mostly a behind the scenes person, who is now going to be our VP of Media as well. She became a member in 2003 and works for Linda's Electric Quilts in McKinney, doing their website work. With our guild, she has been doing anything related to artwork and design. She has spent hundreds of hours in the design of everything from newspaper ads to bookmarks, to pins and tee shirts for our quilt shows. She's very talented graphic artist that we can depend on for all our art needs.

Richard Larson – also does a lot of work behind the scenes, even though he doesn't come to meetings very often. Richard has his own quilting business and produces many winning quilt designs. He is our announcer for our quilt show, works very closely with quilt registration and quilt return to make it run smoothly for our shows. He also promotes the guild in a number of other areas. 
10 ½ x 10 ½ June 2010 Block of the Month

Background – Cream:

Candy wrapper: D. 1@6½x6½

- A. 2@8½x2½
- B. 2@2½x6½
- C. 2@33/8x33/8

Draw a diagonal line from one corner to the opposite corner on the back of "C", and place on corners of "D", as shown . Sew on line. Now draw another line ½" away from this seam line, toward outer point. Sew on this line. Cut in between these 2 seam lines. The half square triangles are "E". Press. Sew "A" to "E"; "B" to "D", and press. Sew all together as shown.
