on a busy tour around Texas, teaching about writing and overcoming obstacles along the way, hoping to shape children's lives for the better. Her first book, "The Stable", was published in 2014.

The Lone Star Heritage Quilt Guild of Sulphur Springs was commissioned by the local Downtown Business Alliance to complete a quilt to commemorate the 10th anniversary of their annual Heritage Square Classic Car Show. Official t-shirts from each of the ten years were used in the quilt, with the middle block an original painting of the Hopkins County Courthouse by local artist Mike Elliott. The original pattern was designed and created by Debra Hager and Marti Rajotte with assistance from Beryl Newsome and Deanna Hasten. Debra also provided the machine quilting. Raffle tickets were sold at the November 7th show, and won by local resident Don Edwards.



For almost three years, the Lone Star Heritage Quilt Guild has had a downtown presence on the Hopkins County courthouse square in Sulphur Springs. In March 2013, the guild began creating quilt displays, first in a county building window, and currently in a window at the Belle Amie Day Spa. Displays are changed at least monthly, with seasonal themes and decorations. Notices of guild meetings, the annual quilt show, and other activities are part of the showcases. This project has been very helpful in the guild's mission of promoting the art and love of guilting in our area.

The 17th annual Lone Star Heritage Quilt Guild's quilt show was held on September 18-19 at the First Baptist Church R.O.C. in Sulphur Springs The theme of "Texas, Deep in the Heart" was also the title of the 2015 raffle quilt, which was won by Terry Havekost of Quitman TX. Over 125 quilts were shown, and the

Best of Show quilt, "Twas the Night Before Christmas" was made by Linda Neal of McKinney TX and guilted by Jackie Brown. Quilt Show Chairman Marti Rajotte has announced that the theme for the 2016 quilt show will be "Autumn Stars" and will be held on September 16 -17 at the R.O.C. Special Interest Meeting Notes Programs

The discussion was led by Sherry Worley from the Quilters Guild of Plano. In addition to short discussions about which speakers each guild liked best and least, there were lively discussions about free or inexpensive programs. Since not every guild either returned or brought their filled out survey, Sherry will scan and email all available returned surveys to members who attended the discussion. TAQG Reps for each guild will also receive the scanned surveys. We hope that they will share the information with the appropriate people in their individual Guilds.

The discussion of free and inexpensive program ideas led to the following suggestions:

- Ask Guild members who normally do not participate in show and tell to
 participate in a bed turning. A bed turning is where you layer all of the quilts
 one on top of another on a bed (or table), discuss the top quilt then remove it
 to reveal the next quilt.
- The McKinney's Quilter Guild held a panel discussion about How and Why You Should Enter your Quilt in a Show. Several experienced members helped lead the discussion and answered questions.
- Studio Tours either real or photographic. If several quilters who live near the usual meeting space will volunteer their studios, members can carpool to actually visit. Red River Valley Quilt Guild asked members for studio photographs and turned them into a calendar. They used the photo shop at Costco and presold the calendar. Their sale price was not much more than what it cost, so it was not price prohibitive to members. With most of the make your own calendar companies, you can add important dates for little or no charge. In a previous calendar, they featured some of their favorite quilts. Photographic studio tours could also be turned into an interesting Guild program. Plus, it would also serve as a good excuse to actually get into those rooms and get them cleaned up!
- Cedar Hill Quilters Guild told us about Trick or Treat. For Trick or Treat, put something you started and do not plan to finish in a bag. At the meeting, each participant picks a bag (no peeking!). Each person, in turn, opens their bag and the person who brought it tells the story of the contents. You keep the bag for one year and have to do some work before you return it to the next Trick or Treat. There are prizes for those who have finished the project. They say one Applecore project bag has really been passed around! We might also suggest that each project contain a record book and perhaps a photo so you remember where each bag started and how far they have progressed.
- The <u>Paint Chip Challenge</u> was explained by the Gun Barrel Quilters Guild. The
 coordinator collects paint chips from local retailers. Each participant draws one
 neutral color chip and one or two color chips. They bring back a block, using

- only those colors at the specified time. You can also use the drawn colors to add borders to the block. This can also be done with crayons to draw the color chips. Another guild who did this challenge showed all of the finished quilts at a guild meeting and gave away Member's Choice Awards.
- The Quilter's Guild of Plano and the Cotton Patch Quilt Guild are having a Do
 It Yourself Border Bash Round Robin.

 The center block is your choice, anything
 goes. Then every other month a new assignment is made, and that technique
 must be incorporated into the next border.
- A suggestions shared by Mineola League of the Arts was to have several
 quilters share quilts with their Quilt Show Critiques. This leads to questions
 and discussion of what Judges are looking for and how to make more successful
 quilts.
- **Granbury Quilter's Guild** suggests having several members bring their favorite things (books, tools, tips, etc.,) to share with the guild. They also suggested make a block like your Grandmother did. Don't use any modern tools or methods. This will bring a whole new appreciation for all of the inventions we now cherish. My cereal boxes are quaking on the shelf! This idea should open many new discussions within a Guild or quilting circle.
- Many Guilds have <u>Skills Night</u> where members volunteer to show their favorite techniques. In July, the **Quilters Guild of Plano** asks members who will be doing free demos at the August Quilt Show to preview their demo for the members. Most members are so busy at the show that we do not have a chance to attend the demos.
- Another activity that might be fun is to plan a fieldtrip to another Guild meeting. Perhaps visit a large Guild when they are having a great out of town speaker. Many Guild's charge a fee when nonmembers attend a meeting with a National Speaker, so you may want to contact them in advance to let them know you are coming. You may be able to negotiate a reduced rate.
- There are several traveling exhibits that your Guild can book for an appearance.
 Some of these include: The <u>Hoffman Challenge</u>, <u>contests from Keepsake</u>
 <u>Quilting</u>, and <u>The Texas Department of Agriculture's (TDA) Quilt Collection</u>.
 Other miscellaneous discussions included:
- Go together with another Guild to share a speaker. You can either share one meeting or if your meetings are close enough on the calendar maybe you can just share expenses. If you do share expenses, please have a contract between the two Guilds, so that everything is spelled out in advance, and no questions arise as to who is supposed to pay for something. One speaker that was suggested for sharing is <u>Suzi Parron</u>. She travels in an RV and tries to put together stops in the same area. Suzi is known for sharing information and photos of Barn Quilts and Barn Quilt Trails. She also does a nice workshop on painting your own barn quilt. Our own Fannin County has the largest Barn
