## Quilt Appraisals. Should you have them done?

Quilt can be appraised for several reasons. 1) for insurance purposes (replacement value 2) to sell them (fair market value), and for donation purposes (to meet IRS guidelines). If you're settling someone's estate, for example, having values professionally assigned to the quilts would be more accurate than guessing their worth. If your kids are ho-hum about looking after your quilts, they might perk once a dollar value is assigned. And squabbles over distribution might diminish with your quilt wealth equitably shared.

Let's say you're entering a quilt show or participating in an exhibit. The show company or exhibit host probably carries a minimum level of insurance to cover your work while it is in their care, but shipping companies may not. If you want to cover your quilt during shipping or if you think your quilt's value exceeds the insurance minimum, having an appraisal is essential.

Should every quilt you own or have created be appraised? Probably not. Bed quilts intended for regular use, baby quilts that will be loved and worn out, and fun and funky wall hanging made for enjoyment. These can be considered labors of love or part of your quilting
journey and let go. If, however, you've created an heirloom piece, collect vintage pieces, or compete with your quilt artistry, consider having your quilts appraised. Remember, no price can be put on sentimental or meaning. And as with any valuable property, if it isn't insured, a loss is total.

## What to expect during the appraisal.

Most quilt appraisals can be arranged via the quilt shows, guild meetings, or quilt documentation days that host appraisers. Some appraisers maintain an office or studio, and some may visit your home, but the public venues are more common. Find an appraiser at quiltappraisers.org or americanquilter.com/about_aqs/appraisersphp.

When you and your quilt meet with an appraiser, explain why you want the appraisal. Expect to see your quilt photographed, measured, and examined front and back. The appraiser may ask you questions, especially about provenance, awards won, or to clear up any construction question. For vintage, name inscribed (signature), and historically significant quilts, bring along any relevant ephemera (papers, letters, patterns, etc.).

Typically, the written appraisal covers the quilt's physical description and workmanship. Descriptive items include the pattern name or title, the date made, the
maker's name, and the type of edge finish and techniques used, among others. Workmanship items address construction, quilting, and condition. Any provenance is included; the more information you can provide, the better. Certified appraisers also provide the purpose of the appraisal, the method used to establish the value, and his or her qualifications.

In 2014, the appraisal cost per quilt ranged from $\$ 30-$ $\$ 50$. This covers the physical examination, valuation, and written report. Save the report with your insurance or other important papers. If an appraiser has back-to-back appointments at a quilt show, your appraisal is likely scheduled for half an hour. Some appraisers will take notes, then write their reports later and send them to you.

## What else do Appraisers do?

Many quilt appraisers can help you identify pattern names on your quilt, explain the fabrics, date it within a quarter century, explain best repair or reproduction methods, and give you other historical information. What they can't do is tell you about selling it, donating it, or otherwise disposing of the quilt. That is up to you.

## Barn Quilts

Suzi Parron's interest in quilting history led her to fascination with barn quilts, which she discovered on a crosscountry camping trip in 2008. A high school English teacher, Suzi spent two years documenting the barn quilt movement, traveling to twenty-nine
 states, gathering stories of these painted quilt patterns and their ties to family and tradition.

The resulting book, "Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement," was published by Ohio University Press in 2012. The success of "Barn Quilts" led to a second book, "Following the Barn Quilt Trail," published in April of 2016.

Suzi gives talks on barn quilts to quilting groups, libraries, and other civic organizations. Her barn quilt painting workshops have added over three thousand quilt blocks to the landscape, from California to Massachusetts.

Suzi and her husband, Glen, left Georgia behind in 2013, in their RV and have called the road their home since. They return to the South each year to celebrate the holidays with family and to spend time kayaking on their favorite Georgia and Florida rivers.

## CARING FOR YOUR QUILTS

If a quilt if more than 50 years old, it is considered an antique and should be handled with great care. Only the airing, vacuuming and storage instructions are recommended for antique quilts. We do not recommend laundering an antique.

## A Few Words About Antique Quilts

If a quilt is more than 50 years old, it is considered and antique and should be handled with great care. Only the airing, vacuuming and storage instructions are recommended for antique quilts. We do not recommend laundering an antique.

## Before Washing a Quilt

Washing a quilt should be a last resort. Often a quilt just needs a good airing and or maybe some quick spot cleaning rather than a full body wash. Read the following information completely before washing a quilt. There may be a gentler way to clean the quilt.

## AIRING QUILTS

Often a quilt may just need a good airing with maybe a little spot cleaning here and there (see Spot Cleaning below).
Airing Indoors ~ If you have a spare bed, lay the quilt out on the bed to air out.
Airing Outdoors ~\#1 rule: No direct sunlight! Place a $100 \%$ cotton sheet on the ground. Place the quilt on the sheet and allow to air out. Move the sheet and quilt as necessary to keep direct sunlight from hitting the quilt.
 clothesline can be used if the quilt is small and it is not a bright sunny day.

## VACUUMING

This is the most non-invasive form of cleaning a quilt. Lay the quilt on a cotton sheet. Place the quilt on top of the sheet. Place a piece of nylon/fiberglass
 screening, (edges covered with twill tape) on top of the quilt. Using a hand attachment and lowest suction setting vacuum the quilt. If you do not have access to the screening, place and old piece of pantyhose over the vacuum attachment and vacuum the quilt.

## SPOT CLEANING (a form of wet cleaning)

If you did not make the quilt and are uncertain as to the fabrics, it is recommended you test each fabric for colorfastness before wet cleaning. Dip a cotton swab in water and rub on an inconspicuous area (if possible) of the quilt. IF any of the dye comes off onto the swab do not wet clean. If the fabric passes the water test move on to testing for cleaning solvent stability. Dip a swab in the solvent you will be using to clean the spot (Orvus soap works best; QuiltWash is not recommended for spot cleaning). Test a dry section of the fabric. Again, if dye comes off on the swab do not wet clean. If the fabrics pass the test. Spot clean away!

## LAUNDERING (a form of wet cleaning)

Test the fabric for color fastness before washing (see Spot Cleaning). Never use a top loading washing machine. The agitation produced can pull at the fibers in the quilt and damage it. Front loading machines do not agitate so they are best for this purpose. Be sure the machine you will be using can handle the quilt, when wet. If not, you may need to go to a laundromat. Be sure to run a cycle through the machine in case the person before you used bleach or harsh detergent.

## DRYING

Dry using the outdoor airing technique described above. If placing small quilts on a clothesline be sure to cover the lone with a cotton sheet first.


## STORING QUILTS

## Air

Store in dark areas with good air circulation. Never store quilts in damp places. If storing on shelves make sure they are painted/finished to avoid damage from the wood.

## Cloth Bag

Again, good air circulation is necessary. Cloth bags made from $100 \%$ cotton work best. This will
 also protect the quilt from any bare wood including cedar chests.

## Quilt Folding

Place acid-free tissue paper between quilt layers. Scrunch tissue paper and place at the folds to avoid pancake
 creases. Refold stored quilts approx. every 6 months so any stress on fibers is relieved and redistributed.

## TDA asks Texas quilters to celebrate Texas sunsets for 2020 quilt competition

AUSTIN, Texas - Calling all Texas quilters, the biennial Texas Department of Agriculture's 2020 Quilt Block Competition will open for submissions soon!

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller is asking quilters from across the Lone Star State to submit quilt blocks celebrating Texas sunsets.
_ "Each year we host this quilt competition, the submissions continue to amaze me," Miller said in a release. "These folks spend countless hours hand-crafting beautiful quilt blocks
showcasing Texas agriculture and just when you think the designs can't get any better- they do! I look forward to this
year's presentation and the stunning Texas sunsets our talented quilters will create."

Participating quilters will create patterns from a selection of natural fibers provided by TDA and up to three additional cotton fabrics. TDA wants quilters to include one special piece of cotton fabric that personally represents family, history or heritage.

Entries are due by June 30.
TDA will start accepting applications and mailing the fabric packets in February. To receive information when this opportunity becomes available, quilters can contact Emily Miller at 512-463-7425 or Emily.Miller@Texasagriculture.gov.

All entries will be judged by a panel of independent, outside individuals who will select the winning blocks to be pieced together into a quilt and unveiled at the Family Land Heritage ceremony this fall at the State Capitol in Austin.

TDA's Family Land Heritage program honors Texas families who have kept their land in continuous agricultural operation for 100 years or more. This celebration of Texas agriculture has been taking place since 1974, and 2020 will mark the combination of two TDA traditions - Family Land Heritage and the Quilt Block Competition.
